# Iowa State University Professor Named Seed Science Endowed Chair

Gary Munkvold, an internationally recognized seed pathologist, will serve a three-year term as the Iowa State University's Seed Science Endowed Chair, a newly created post. He will lead a research, outreach and teaching program in seed health in the department of plant pathology and at the Seed Science Center. Munkvold was a plant pathology faculty member at Iowa State from 1993 through 2002. He researched diseases in agronomic crops. Since 2003, he served as research coordinator for the Pathology, Entomology and Seed Science Group at Pioneer Hi-Bred International. Munkvold got his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Illinois, and a Ph.D. in plant pathology in 1992 from the University of California.

#### **Organic Lobby Concedes GM - Coexistence is Inevitable**

Organic farming and genetically modified cropping will co-exist, two of organic farming's staunchest defenders admitted at a public debate in London as <u>DEFRA's consultation on co-existence</u> draws to a close this week. But DEFRA proposals for keeping the crops separate are too weak, they insisted. Wider separation distances, a lower limit for GM contamination of organic seed, a compulsory register of fields growing GM crops and improved liability rules are all needed, they said. "Co-existence will happen, because of the big dollars behind GM," organic farmer Oliver Dowding told the Farming and the Future: Can GM and Organic Crops Co-exist? debate organized by the Agricultural Biotechnology Council and chaired by Radio 4's Today Program star John Humphrys. "I expect we will see it, but we need more robust and more transparent protocols in place," agreed Lawrence Woodward, director of Elm Farm Research Centre. Damage to organic farming's marketing message was a key concern. "I can see a greater risk from co-existence, because of the impact on my market, and I'm not prepared to take any risk at the moment, because I can see all the risk and no benefit for me," said Mr. Dowding. After the debate Mr. Woodward told Farmers Weekly he would be happy with a 0.1% limit for GM in organic seed, instead of the proposed 0.5% limit. He also wanted wider separation distances, more in line with earlier trials, and a register of fields growing GM crops, plus better liability provision, such as the laws in place in Germany or the industry fund in Denmark. Herts farmer Bob Fiddaman, who chairs <u>SCIMAC</u>, the UK breeding industry's co-existence initiative, said co-existence was quite achievable. "Give farmers the protocols and we can implement them. I grow double low rapeseed for food use and HEAR industrial rape which is poisonous to humans. With the right separation distances and on-farm protocols I can meet the 0.3% admix threshold, even with volunteers to cope with. It has been measured and it can be done. We can do the same with GM." He felt GM crops would be grown in the UK by 2010, particularly if BASF's blight tolerant GM potatoes, which are currently under field evaluation, prove a success. The debate came against a backdrop of almost 70,000ha of GM crops being grown across the EU this season, with co-existence measures particularly well advanced in the Czech Republic, and fast being developed in Spain, France and Germany. #### Dale Miksch Named Iowa Seed Association's 2006 Honorary Member

During the ISA convention held on November 13-14, 2006, President Bielenberg announced Dale Miksch as the latest recipient of its highest honor, the Honorary Member Award. The Honorary Member award began in 1949 and is presented to a person who has had a significant impact on the seed industry and who has served as part of the ISA with distinction. Mr. Miksch has spent 40 years of his career in the seed business. He not only made significant contributions in Iowa but throughout the world which seems appropriate in keeping with the 2006 ISA Convention theme: *Iowa Seed in a Global Market*.

Dale Miksch was born in Labette, Kansas as the son of a Kansas farmer. He grew up in a family with one brother and two sisters. He graduated from Kansas State in 1957 with a major in Animal Science. While attending Kansas State University he was a member of the Farmhouse Fraternity. After graduation, Mr. Miksch went to Pakistan for several months as part of an international farm youth exchange. Upon his return he became a 4-H Club agent from 1958 through 1960. During that time, he went to Washington D.C. for graduate studies in the 4-H extension service. While there, he met Bev, whom he married in May, 1961.

In 1960 he went to work for Rudy Patrick and continued in their employment through 1968. During that period, he spent part of his time working in both Mexico and Puerto Rico and continued to expand his international production skills. Dale left Rudy Patrick to go to work for what was then known as Garst and Thomas Seed Company. While working there, he served in various seed corn production related positions. His final position at Garst and Thomas, prior to his retirement, was International Seed Production Representative. While working at Garst he had the opportunity to travel to Europe and South America for seed related activities. He was very involved in a project in the Ukraine to try to improve agriculture production in that region. Between trips to South America, Mr. Miksch was able to serve on the Iowa Seed Association Board and was President in 2000. After his presidency, he not only retired from the Seed Association, but also from the seed business itself.

Although our honorary member spent a fair amount of time out of the country, he and his wife still found time to raise 3 sons and host 4 foreign exchange students. His sons Scott, Gary, and Jeff have blessed him with 8 grandchildren. Since his retirement he has been able to spend time doing the things he truly enjoys such as traveling both in the US and abroad. He and his wife have had the opportunity to visit three of the exchange students that they hosted. He also finds time to golf and fish with friends.
